

# APSIG – Annual Report (2017) – initial draft

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## 1. INTRODUCTION

Asia Pacific School on Internet Governance (APSIG) was founded in 2015, and targets 500~1,000 Internet governance leaders and experts in Asia Pacific for their professional upgrade and refresh programs. APSIG expects national and other regional SIGs in Asia Pacific to cover 5,000~10,000 Internet governance practitioners and students.

### 1.1 Preparation

The initial preparation on APSIG started in August 2015 to target the first APSIG course in 2016Q3.

We developed the initial Program with cooperation of Asia Pacific regional Internet Governance Forum Multistakeholder Advisory Group (APrIGF MAG) as well APSIG Discuss Group in October 2016 with six tracks and around 20 classes. Each track consists of two to four 90-minutes classes. By the end of November 2016, the thirteen Core Classes were defined with class outlines, class descriptions, lecturer candidates and references. The Program was further refined before and after 2016 APSIG. The Program, Version 3.0 consists of seven tracks with 15 core classes as well as around 15 more classes now. Please refer APSIG Program webpage for further information.

The initial fundraising started in 2015Q4, and contributions were made by four organizations for 2016 APSIG; Google, Asia Pacific Top Level Domain Consortium (APTLD), Internet Society and Internet Cooperation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN). We added a few more contributors for 2017 APSIG; Verisign, Silicon Valley Community Foundation with Cisco, Amazon, and Asia Pacific Alliance of Schools and Academics on Internet Governance (APASA) which is the alliance of regional Internet organizations including Asia Pacific Network Information Center (APNIC), ICANN Asia Pacific Hub (APAC), Internet Society Asia Pacific (ISOC APAC), and DotAsia.

APSIG Facilitator Group was established in 2016 to handle the 2016 APSIG administration. Asia Institute of Technology (AIT) in Bangkok was selected as the 2016 APSIG venue in March 2016, followed by its lecturers and participants in 2016Q2-Q3. Surprisingly, there are over 200 applicants from over 30 countries to 30 slots allocated to general participants in addition to 10 slots for lectures and administrative staffs. Speaker Group was formed in May 2016 to handle the 2016 APSIG curriculum. We decided to hold eight 90-minutes classes, a 7-hour role play class, a 60-minutes hot topic session, and 180-minutes closing session with panel discussion and open discussion.

For 2017 APSIG, Finance and Program Committee were set up in the fall of 2016 to manage APSIG finance and APSIG program, respectively. We further set up two subcommittees under Finance Committee; Recommendation Subcommittee and APSIG/Amazon Fellowship Subcommittee. We also set up All SIG Group to address coordination of SIGs and related organizations. We phased out Facilitator Group and Speaker Group.

We had similar number of applicants for 2017 APSIG, 215 for 35 seats in addition to 9 lecturers and 2 administrative staffs. We offered ten 90-minutes classes, one case study session, one BoF session on IGF workshop proposal review, two lightning talk sessions, and the opening and closing sessions.

Selections of general participants were not easy. How can we select 35 participants from 215 applicants? For 2016 APSIG, the seven subgroups of Facilitator Group reviewed 30 applicants each,

and we compiled the evaluations of the seven subgroups to come up with the final candidate list. For 2017 APSIG, Recommendation Subcommittee did the initial screening of all 215 applicants and came up with the recommended list with ranking. Finance Committee finalized the general participant list based on the ranking provided by Recommendation Subcommittee. We gave priority to Government officials to make multistakeholders more evenly distributed. We also give high priority to new countries to APSIG in order to maximize the number of countries which participate APSIG. More factors were considered. ## **1.2 Management Structure**

The APSIG management structure for the two-year Pilot Project (2015-2017) consists of

- Two-year APSIG Pilot Project Manager in charge of finance  
The Pilot Project Manager was superseded by Finance Committee in September 2016.  
Two subcommittees, Recommendation Subcommittee and APSIG/Amazon Fellowship Subcommittee were created for 2017 APSIG activities.
- APSIG-Discuss for individual members on open discussion and consensus development
- Speaker Group to deliver 2016 APSIG Program  
The Speaker Group was superseded by Program Committee in September 2016.
- Secretariat
- Facilitator Group to facilitate APSIG activity  
The Facilitator Group was superseded by All SIG Group and Secretariat in September 2016.

## **1.3 APSIG Website and Mailing Lists**

APSIG developed its website, APSIG.asia in September 2015 as the focal point of all APSIG activities with the following web pages; Home, About, Program, 2016 APSIG, 2017 APSIG, 2018 APSIG, All SIG Group, Amazon Fellowship, Library, APSIG Alumni and Country Information.

## **2 2017 APSIG SCHOOL**

The second APSIG course was held at Sukosol Hotel in Bangkok, Thailand with support of IntERLab of AIT as the local organizer. It was held over five days in 2017-07-22 – 26.

## **2.2 Participants**

There are 51 participants from 21 countries and regions as follows;

- 9 lecturers
- 34 onsite participants
- 6 remote presenters (and more remote participants)
- 2 secretariat staffs

## **2.3 All SIG Group**

There are many national and regional SIGs being developed in Asia from the first SIG courses in Beijing in 2011 by APILP and in Kuwait by MEAC-SIG in 2014. MEAC-SIG organized pkSIG with the local host in Islamabad in 2015. The number of SIG courses grew to four SIG in 2016; APSIG, APIGA, pkSIG, and inSIG. Six or more SIG courses are expected to be held in 2017 including afSIG, IkIGF with SIG Track, APSIG, pkSIG, APIGA and inSIG. We expect eight or more SIG courses in Asia Pacific in 2018. APSIG decided to address on various SIG activities starting from SIG presentations at 2016 APSIG, and All SIGs Dinner during Hyderabad inSIG in 2016 where we invite many national and regional SIGs in the world. There was All SIG Meeting hosted by ICANN APRALO with APSIG during Hyderabad ICANN Meeting in the same week as 2016 inSIG. There was a meeting on SIGs during the 2016 IGF, too.

APSIG organized the first All SIG Meeting with the half-day program during 2017 APSIG with the

following agenda;

Part 1: Updates of SIGs and related organizations

Five out of eleven presentations are made remotely.

Part 2: Discussion on common issues; SIG curriculum and SIG collaboration

Part 3: Open discussion

The second All SIG Meeting of APSIG will be held during Day 0 Events of 2017 IGF in Geneva. The second meeting on SIGs organized by EuroSSIG is expected to be held during 2017 IGF, too.

### **3 APSIG PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT**

We are developing a generic program (curriculum) for APSIG and other SIGs during the two-year APSIG pilot project in 2015-2017 so that each national or regional SIG could customize their program. We expect that this program would lead to an open courseware. We made all contents to be under Creative Commons license so that the course materials including presentation materials and videos could be shared globally. We hope that these development efforts would help eventually to develop Massively Open Online Courses (MOOCs), which are not available today.

APSIG Program consists of seven tracks, and each track consists of two to five classes with the total of around 30 classes including 15 Core Classes. Additionally, there are BoF Sessions, Lightning Talk Sessions, and Case Study Sessions as well as Opening Dinner Meeting and Closing Session. Details of APSIG Program can be found in APSIG.asia website under Program webpage. The Program has gone through numerous revisions in the past two years, and APSIG Program, Version 3.0 will be available in 2017Q3.

Seven tracks are as follows;

- Internet Governance – General (with 4 classes)
- Internet Governance – Perspective (with 4 classes)
- Internet Governance – Stakeholders (with 2 classes)
- Human Rights (and Internet Governance) (with 4 classes)
- Cyber Security (and Internet Governance) (with 4 classes)

- Internet Governance – Extended (with 4 classes)

There are seven classes in Additional Candidate Classes in addition to the above twenty-two classes under seven tracks now.

We need to constantly update the content of each class as well as adding new classes and modifying the existing classes. We expect the next major revision two years later in 2019 for 2020s.

#### **4 APSIG/AMAZON FELLOWSHIP**

We were wondering on APSIG alumni's participation to IGF for some time. Its participation is very important. But, it is expensive and travel supports for IGF are not widely available except Internet Society. During discussion with Amazon, we found out that we share a similar idea that IGF participation from Asia-Pacific along Latin America and Africa is very important. Amazon is ready to support a few fellows from Asia-Pacific. We decided to work with Amazon in 2017, and added additional fellows from APSIG. Thus, we started APSIG/Amazon fellowship program with the newly created APSIG/Amazon Fellowship subcommittee to handle the fellowship program with the Satish Babu as the founding chair with five additional members who organized IGF Workshops in the past.

We posted the call for fellowships in short notice. It was surprising popular, and we received twenty applicants. Eight of the twenty applicants were with 2017 IGF workshop proposals, and another application is with a paper submission to Giganet Symposium. We selected three Amazon Fellows and two APSIG Fellows for 2017 IGF participation. They are required to submit the reports which we will archive as APSIG Reports. Some of the reports will also be submitted to IGF and/or Amazon.

We plan to increase the fellowship program with ten or more fellows per year and encourage them to actively participate IGF activities such as organizing IGF workshops. We also encourage all national SIGs to regularly participate IGF activities, too.

#### **5 2018 APSIG PLAN**

We have gone through the two-year APSIG pilot project in 2015-2017, and have better understanding on what we would like to organize as an annual APSIG school now even though we still have many issues to resolve in the coming years which we address in the next chapter.

We are planning 2018 APSIG as the full five-day course with Day 0 event such as the opening dinner session. We also plan to have the half-day All SIG Meeting as well as the half-day recreation. We plan to have around twelve 90-minutes classes and around four 90-minutes sessions.

Additionally, we plan to have regular and short BoF sessions in some of the evenings.

We plan to have a similar number of participants to the past years; around 10 lecturers, 30-35 participants, and 2 secretariat staffs with additional support from AIT/intERlab. The participants would be evenly distributed with full support, partial support, and registration fee exemption/no support.

## **6 ISSUES and REMARKS**

There are many issues to be resolved in the coming years. Some of them have not been solved in the past two years, and some are new issues we would like to address in the coming years.

### **(A) Selection of Participants**

How do we select 30 participants from 200 participants? "I have applied twice, and I stated that I don't need any financial support. But, I was not selected at all. Shall I give up to apply?" These are some of the questions we need to resolve every year. These are not easy issues, and there are no correct answers. In the first year, 2016, Facilitators Group came up with the recommendation lists through its seven subgroups evaluating 30 applicants each. The project manager with the secretariat finalized the participant list based on the recommendation lists. In the second year, 2017, we selected 35 participants with the three steps. Recommendation subcommittee selected 85 out of 215 with quantitative analysis, followed by ranking of these 85 candidates through qualitative analysis. Finance Committee came up with the final 35 participants, many of whom are with financial supports.

We need to address the following and other issues when we select the participants;

1. Selection of participants vs financial support
2. Leaders and experts, and others
3. Stakeholders
4. Alumni
5. Distribution among subregions and countries

### **(B) APSIG Alumni**

We have around 100 alumni including APSIG Fellows to national SIGs such as inSIG and pkSIG, and we are adding 40-50 per year. How do we take care of APSIG alumni including maintaining alumni

network, when to come back to back to the next annual APSIG school, active participation on APSIG and other Internet governance activities, and so on. Some organizations including Diplo are doing very well, but others are not. We need to investigate on these matters and come up with our Alumni policy.

### **(C) Remote Presentation and Participation**

We are actively working on remote presentations and other remote participations including streaming and access to the past classes. They are not easy unless we have much funding to employ professional staffs with expensive equipment. The network bandwidth could be another problem as we encountered in 2017. But, we have determined to work on these areas to broaden the participations. Many participants are not familiar with the remote presentation. Many countries in Asia Pacific could not offer good networking services to support remote presentations or streaming. The streaming of the class was not easy either due to lack of required network bandwidth or lack of experience on operating streaming services. We decided to hire more experienced operators of the streaming service for 2018 APSIG. We also need to work on video recording and remote conversations in order to improve quality of these services without spending much money.

### **(D) Archive APSIG Materials**

We are actively working on archiving of our activities from the beginning in 2015; Program (curriculum), video of the past APSIG schools, presentation materials, and other documents. They are under Creative Commons license so that national SIGs and other organizations could use our archive effectively.

All class videos are accessible through YouTube and other websites in the regular HD format, and Computer History Museum (pending) in the full HD format. APSIG website has been planned to be available at least for the next fifty years through arrangement with Google. The APSIG website is also mirrored at jinbo.net for additional accessibility.



## **(E) APSIG Core Group**

How do we develop a core group of APSIG so that APSIG could be sustained well? We don't have the answer today. Some SIGs have their lecturer groups as the core groups. But, this may not work well at APSIG as we have only 30% or less of lecturers are returning lecturers. We are also working on development of national SIG leader groups which could functions as the core group, but this would take time; 5 years or more. We may also looking into APSIG-Discuss Group or its subgroup as the core group, but this remains to be seen. We are also looking into combination of the above groups as the core group. We need to revisit on this issue in the coming years until we will have formed the APSIG core group.

## **(F) All SIG Group with National SIGs**

APSIG plans to serve 500-1,000 Internet governance leaders and experts in Asia Pacific with expectation of national and other SIGs to serve 5,000-10,000 Internet governance practitioners and beginners. We are having several new national SIGs every year now, and we expect ten or more national and SIGs in Asia-Pacific by 2020. In order to have good coordination, we decided to form All SIG Group with its charter in 2017 after one year experiment on interfacing with national SIGs.

We need to coordinate in many areas; human resource development, SIG program development, regular meetings, and financial coordination. We are having an annual half-day meeting during the annual APSIG with elaborate remote participation, and a short meeting during the annual IGF this year.

## **(G) Goals of APSIG**

What are the goals of APSIG? How can we measure success or failure of APSIG and other SIGs based on the goals? These are the issues we need to address in the coming years.

Obvious goals include the following;

1. Real world projects

We are encouraging APSIG alumni to work on real world projects and present on the

projects at SIGs as well as at IGFs. We organize case study sessions for this purpose at APSIG. We may need more proactive efforts to encourage engaging on the real world projects.

## 2. Organizational efforts

We are working on development of national SIGs as well as their annual schools. Their leaders are expected to present their status at All SIG Meeting, and exchange information at annual APSIGs and elsewhere. We may need more elaborate coordination on the organizational effort.

## 3. Publication and Speech

Publication and speech are obvious goals, and we are encouraging publication of articles and books as well as giving speeches at APSIG and other events around the world.

We need to visit on the goals regularly to make sure if we are doing right. We also need external reviews regularly.
